Bushes and trees that provide food for the birds

Bushes and trees that provide food for the birds – as I look out my window, I see my winterberry bush covered with red berries against the snow. The view is spectacular, and lately it has been enhanced by visits

from a flock of bluebirds and robins. What a winter bird magnet! Winter berry is both native and cultivated. It is a deciduous bush in the Holly family Ilex verticllata. It is call winterberry holly and is native to the eastern half of the United States and has bright red sprays of berries to ornament your yard.

Another bird magnet I have mentioned before is a native Red Mulberry, Morus ruba, also an edible berry for both birds and humans that grows in the summer. It is usually in the form of a tree that can grow up to 60'. It is a messy tree, so don't plant by a patio or driveway. Another bird magnet!

A holly, ilex spp, is an evergreen bush that produces berries. It's the female plant that produces the berries, but



a male holly plant has to be planted nearby in order to get fruit.

Other berry bearing plants are choke cherry, staghorn sumac, native viburnums, beautyberry and white snow berry.

LASAGNA FLATBREAD

Recipe for January 2023 Thank you Jeanne Aras for this latest recipe

- 1 15 oz. container ricotta cheese
- 3 oz. parmesan cheese
- 2 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 1 ¹/₂ jar marina sauce

- 8 oz. shredded mozzarella, divided 1 egg
- 1 lb. sausage
- 6 flatbreads

Combine ricotta, ¹/₂ mozzarella, parmesan cheese, egg & Italian seasonings in a bowl, Cook sausage in a skillet, until no longer pink. Add marinara sauce. Spread 1/6 of the cheese mixture evenly on each flatbread. Cover with sausage mixture. Top with remaining mozzarella. Bake in a preheated 375 degree oven until cheese is melted and bubbly, 10 to 15 minutes.

JUNCOS ARE THE ORIGINAL SNOWBIRDS

As winter arrives, flocks of these lively little birds suddenly appear.

By now, retirees and other people who want to escape

rive to spend the winter. They've been nesting in the mountains or farther north. To them, this is a benign winter habitat.

These juncos often find seed feeders for winter feasting. Watch for a small bird with a dark sooty hood that covers its head and chest, a grey-brown back, and a white belly. However, the most attention-grabbing aspect of this

winter have headed to parts of the Southwest, or to sunny Florida. We call them "snowbirds," because they leave as soon as the snow begins to fall and temperatures drop.

But there's another type of snowbird — the Dark-eyed Junco.

Although you may see Darkeyed Juncos here in summer, come fall, many, many more ar-



shy junco is its tail. As the bird darts off, giving a sharp twittering call, it flashes the white outer feathers of its tail. Enjoy these Dark-eyed Juncos now and through the winter. Come spring, most of these snowbirds will head north or into higher elevations to begin a new breeding cycle.

New Year's Traditions from Cultures Around the World

Wearing White (Brazil)

In Brazil, the new year is regarded as a time to reflect upon the past and make new resolutions for the coming year. Everyone wears white because the color signifies luck, prosperity, and is meant to ward off bad spirits. As the tradition goes, revelers gather on the beaches donning white garb where they jump seven waves—a lucky number in Brazilian culture-for good fortune and throw flowers into the water as an offering to Lemanjá, the goddess of the sea.

Spring Festival (China)

The Lunar New Year is the most important holiday in China, and millions of people around the world participate in the celebration. Also known as the Spring Festival, this 15day long celebration has a different date every year, following the Lunar Calendar instead of the Gregorian Calendar.

Homes and cities are lined with red decorations-a color that symbolizes good luck and good fortune-such as red lanterns to ward off bad luck and jianzhi, red paper cutouts that hang on walls. Fireworks are set off on both New Year's Eve and again the next morning as a means to ward off negative energy.

Smashing Plates (Denmark)


One of the most popular New Year's traditions in Denmark involves smashing plates and old dishes. Danish residents save their unused dinnerware and affectionately shatter them against doors of their families and friends as a way to ward off bad spirits.

Other traditions include jumping off chairs at midnight to "leap" into the new year and consuming Kransekage, a wreath-shaped cake created using marzipan rings stacked on top of each other with a bottle of wine in the center. The cake is decorated with ornaments and flags.

Dropping Ice Cream (Switzerland)

In celebration of the New Year, the Swiss channel good luck, wealth, and abundance by dropping a dollop of ice cream on the floor at midnight. They also line the streets in colorful costumes and perform symbolic ceremonies intended to chase away negative spirits. Festival of Saint Basil (Greece)

The Greek celebration of the New Year is also known as the Festival of Saint Basil, honoring the founder of the Greek Orthodox Church. Each year, there are a number of celebrations that take place as a means to attract luck and bring prosperity. An onion, for example, is traditionally hung on the door of homes as a symbol of rebirth, and on New Year's Day, parents wake children by tapping them on the head with the onion.
