There were many more I was blessed to work with and I will mention them more later. I think I am getting tears in my keyboard typing this.

Now comes the thank you's. Since this is in the Breeze (the best local paper ever produced) I have to give a huge thanks to Tom Lak the editor of the breeze. Everyone would always tell me how much they like my ad every month. I would give Tom my words, usually late, then he would give me shit for poor grammar and being late. Then he would fix it and add his magic graphics and make it special. Thank you Tom for keeping the breeze going and making me look way smarter and funnier than I am. Could have never done it without you.

I couldn't have asked for a better group of customers. Of course I needed to make a buck to pay my bills but it was never about the money. It was about creating a place that served good food at a fair price with an atmosphere that made everyone feel at home. I think we did that in no small part because of my great and friendly co-workers. If you didn't feel at home then maybe you should have gone back to the flat lands.

In the past week I have been closing up and looking at a lot of the stuff I have accumulated over the years. I realized that a lot of the stuff was given to me. I am a big fan of passing it forward. I am trying to do that. The biggest thing I would like to pass forward is the grille itself. I

told the landlords I would help in any way to assist them in finding someone to keep the grill going. I think the community benefits from a place like the Grille. I remember when I first opened there were three or four tables in our small dining room all having breakfast and they were all neighbors. Only they had never met each other. Well before they left they all knew each other. Doesn't get much better than that.

My first server was Mary. A young mom that came in with a baby on her hip and a tattoo on her chest with her baby's name. Not the way I would suggest applying for a job but she answered my questions right. I asked if she was nice and did she like people. The real qualities I was looking for. The rest I knew I could work with. That was the same with every one that worked with me. It wasn't always easy for me but I knew that was what was needed in a small town and the right way to be.

I love working with younger kids and watching

them learn and grow. Hopefully I helped and didn't hurt with my foul language and bad jokes. My policy was always that after high school they better be moving onto bigger and better things or I would fire them. It never came to that. They would also have to come in and say hi whenever they were around. It was also expected that when they came in and we were busy they would help out. That went for any of my coworkers. I never had to ask, they just did it. Like I said before it was like family. It didn't hurt that I would feed them for free. Most of the time they would go in the drawer and pay behind my back. Hell who doesn't feed family when they come by.

It's two in the morning as I am writing this because I want to say these things and can't sleep until I do. I think I am going to make myself an adult beverage to maybe inspire my words or maybe make them more confusing. Good thing I don't have to work in the morning.

MY COWORKERS

I will start with Jennie A. The grandma, friend, mom, and wife anyone would be lucky to have. You won't find a harder worker than her, that's for sure. Oh yea she is a pretty damn good baker too and her cooking doesn't suck that's for sure. I have been

eating her food for as long as I have known her. I had a turkey dinner she made just tonight. She would bring in food and say "I got dinner for you" not once did I ever ask her to do that. Those that have known her longer than I have know that is the way she is. Even

since I have closed she has been there every day helping me clean up. I didn't ask her but that is the way she is and thank God for that. No one has ever liked making hot chocolate more than her, especially if it was for kids. She embodied the family atmosphere way more than I ever could. I could go on and on but I will end with this. I have been around a bit and seen a lot of shocking things. I loved telling her a shocking story or experience just to see the look on her face.

Jennie K did not shock as easily, that's for sure. When I first opened her husband Mike came to the counter and I thought what does this giant man want? He said "I heard you were looking for some help and I have four kids". I was kind of afraid to tell him I was all set with help. Well two of his daughters and later his wife did work with me. Even before any of them worked at the grille their family kind of took me in. Jennie was bringing me in stuff

She is also on the fire department and starting nursing school in the fall.

Welcome back! Just in time for fall planting of cool weather veggies

Sept. is the month to:

• plant cool weather vegetables such as spinach, lettuce, arugula, kale, Bok choy and mustard greens. The seeds can be directly seeded into the soil. Root crops like



- radishes, turnips, carrots and beets have short crop times and so can be planted by seed in early Sept. Broccoli, cauliflower and cabbage should be planted as transplants.
- Plant garlic in late Sept through Oct. Cloves are planted 3 to 4" deep with root side down. Garlic needs a cold period for proper shoot and bulb development.
- Divide spring and summer perennials. Dividing these plants when not in bloom allows all the plant energy to go to root and leaf growth.
- Plant daffodils, tulips and crocus for spring bloom. Plant bulbs two to three times deeper than their diameter.
- Add organic matter to soil.

- Bring houseplants summering outdoors back inside before frost.
- Cool temperatures stimulate Thanksgiving and Christmas cactus flowering.

SHRIMP CAESAR PASTA SALAD

8 ox, penne pasta

1/4 cup grated parm cheese

1 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice

1 Tbsp. olive oil

1 ½ cups shredded Romaine lettuce

2 medium ripe tomatoes, chopped

1 tsp. Worcester sauce

1/4 cup mayo

1/4 cup sour cream

1/4 tsp. finely grated garlic

8 oz. peeled & deveined shrimp{raw} or used cooked

1/4 cup finely chopped celery

*Salt & pepper to taste

Cook pasta according to directions, drain & rinse with cold water to cool. Whisk the mayo, parm cheese, sour cream, lemon juice, Worcester sauce, garlic and salt & pepper in a large bowl. Cook shrimp if using raw. Add cooked, cooled shrimp, romaine, celery and tomatoes to bowl with pasta and dressing. Best if served right away. Makes 4 – 6 servings.
